# Fr. Doug's Iconic Column

It is hard to believe that we are already at the end of January 2021. It has been a significant month at the national level and at the level of the Diocese of Oregon. We have concluded the month with the ordination and consecration of our new Bishop Diana Akiyama.

This past Tuesday, the clergy had their first Zoom meeting with Bishop Diana, when we discussed the ends and outs of how to have Ash Wednesday under pandemic conditions. While vaccinations are happening and we are all anticipating the day when we will get our first one, it will still be some time before that happens for all of us. And then there is the unanswered question about whether people who have had both doses will still be able to be carriers of the virus. So how things will look at St. John during the next few months is still up in the air.

Given all the good input that I received on Tuesday's meeting from the Bishop and other clergy, I am sure that our celebration of Ash Wednesday will still be online. What this means is that I will not be giving the imposition of ashes during the service. But with the thoughtful ideas shared at the meeting I am in the process of developing a plan for how to make the service meaningful despite the restrictions. So, stay tuned for more information about this in a couple weeks.

Innovation seems to be the name of the game during the season of COVID. But for all of us, we long for less innovation and more of the familiar. This season is not over with yet, but my hope is that in a couple months we may be able to start the process of gradually moving back toward some semblance of "normal."

Like many of you, I miss being with you all. So until we are able to be together in person, be safe, watch out for those you encounter and may the Spirit of God hold us together until we meet again.

## Signs of Change

Change is not greeted favorably by everyone, but change is what everyone needs in order to flourish. The year 2020 brought the types of change no one wants: illness and hardship, rancor and violence, fear and death. Yet a young poet, Amanda Gorman, was able to glean some good out of all of this:

> "...Let the globe, if nothing else, say this is true. That even as we grieved, we grew. That even as we hurt, we hoped. That even as we tired, we tried...."

One of last year's many disappointments was not being able to formally welcome Fr. Doug Hale through an installation ceremony presided over by the Bishop planned for late April. It's one of those traditional events that blesses and solidifies a bond between clergy and congregation, but it was cancelled due to pandemic restrictions. By that time, Fr. Hale was three and a half months into his tenure as our Priest-in-Charge and no stranger to our congregation, having frequently served as our Supply Priest. Some might argue a ceremony was not necessary, but ceremony is our customary way of marking notable changes in our lives: birthdays, baptisms, confirmations, graduations, marriages, anniversaries, ordinations, installations, inaugurations and burials. The *Book of Common Prayer* has prayers and pages devoted to most of these. What they all have in common is the desire of a whole community to acknowledge and celebrate the achievement of individuals growing into their full God-given potential.

Late last month, our nation inaugurated a new President and our Diocese installed a new Bishop. These two epic events were marked by ritual celebrations – some traditional and some modified by Covid-19 restrictions. They tested the creativity of the event organizers, and may even influence how such events are handled in a future Covid-free world, because they seemed to feature more key participants and observers than ever before. I, for one, preferred the optics of a sea of fluttering flags on the National Mall to a packed crowd of people struggling to see and stay warm. Such alterations in our customs were unthinkable a year ago, but we are older and braver and more tech-savvy now.

This month, a new Senior Warden and Bishop's Advisory Committee will take over administrative leadership at St. John. Passing of the gavel would normally take place at the Annual Meeting on February 7<sup>th</sup>, but will happen more quietly a few days later, since we are still prevented from meeting in person. I hope you will give them all the support and encouragement you have given to the retiring BAC members and especially to me. The year 2021 has already begun to bring many changes. Let's embrace all the good changes to come.

## **Good Neighbor Food Pantry**

In January, Denise Skillman again took our donations to the community food pantry. Our St. John contributions totaled a whopping **200 pounds**!

Many of us may not be aware that we are also the pantry conduit for one of our Old Town merchants because somehow we are listed as a charitable food pantry. Cranberry Sweets always gives us their seasonal overproduction to take to the pantry. And more recently, they also sent us their overproduction of flavored popcorn — and more great candy!. These are wonderful treats that would not otherwise be available for pantry clients.

If you are not doing so, please patronize the Old Town merchant that generously passes along its good treats. And give our own Denise thanks and a pat on the back for picking up and delivering the goodies to the ecumenical community food pantry.
