Fr. Doug's Iconíc Column

The repeal of Roe v. Wade by the Supreme Court has stoked the fire of the abortion debate in our country. I cannot address the legal theory aspects of the longstanding decision, but it seems to me that the Roe v. Wade decision tried to find some middle ground between two divergent views.

Unfortunately, the issue of abortion does not present us with a simple choice between two views. We humans like to have easy ethical choices. We easily reduce the debate to "Pro-Abortion" or "Pro-Choice." It is either about protecting the life of the unborn or protecting a woman's sovereignty over her own body.

I saw a photo of a young woman at an anti-abortion protest holding a sign that stated that she was alive and thriving as the result of rape and incest and then being adopted. The sign seemed to be a dismissal of the idea of allowing abortion when the pregnancy was caused by rape. Such children must protected no matter how they were conceived. While recognizing the value of her life, there was no expression of awareness of what her birth mother went through, other than that she was raped. There was no recognition about whether she had family support in a family where incest occurred. Was she emotionally supported or was she ridiculed? Was she financially supported or forced to fend for herself? Did the birth mother honorably choose to give life to this young woman, or was she given no choice?

And then there are the signs that are held up that support the woman's right to choose, to have control of her own bodies. These slogans do not even touch on the question of the value of the fetus within her. Is this fetus a human being? When does human life really begin? When does this life become important enough that it must be protected? Is it conception? Viability? Birth?

Then there is something unique about this ethical dilemma. Two lives are inextricably tied together for nine months. Their breaths are one. How can we make simple pronouncements about something so unusual?

Also, two living beings are required to begin this new life. Making the woman solely responsible for the choice of an abortion or the bearing of the child is also simplistic. Most of the slogans for or against tend not to take into consideration the man and his responsibilities.

In this country, we pledge our allegiance to "one nation...with liberty and justice for all." It is easy in our debates to focus on one or the other. We tend to take the easy way and want our liberty, our freedoms, and then demand justice from others. But we pledge to support liberty AND justice, not just one or the other, and we pledge it FOR ALL, not just some. Holding these two values together at the same time makes the abortion debate anything but simple.

This last Sunday, our New Testament text came from Paul's Letter to the Galatians. He wrote,

"For freedom Christ has set us free.... For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. For the whole law is summed up in a single commandment. You shall love your neighbor as yourself." (Gal. 5:1,13-14)

Christ has set us free, not just from something but also for something. Ironically, God frees us so that we can become servants to others. This is the way of love. While this can be stated simply, it is not simple to apply it. How do we love our neighbors, pregnant women, men who have "spread their seed" with love or with violence, unborn or born children, people protesting, our enemies? It is not easy. It is not simple. But by the grace of God and the wisdom of God, we may be able to move in that direction.

I do not have all, or even most, of the answers to this issue. But I do know that I have appreciated a few members of our fellowship offering to me some of their thinking. They have enriched my thinking. I invite you to join in the conversation, not in defense of your position but in hopes that we will all grow in wisdom.

I was invited by Roy Arnoldt to volunteer at E.A.T. This stands for Everyone At the Table. It is a free meal for anyone and is offered every Tuesday night. Fifteen to thirty people will show up for a home- cooked meal. Donations are accepted.

This organization provides a hot meal for anyone, but especially people who may not always have enough to eat. Coming out for a meal is a chance for people to socialize. The atmosphere is joyful at EAT.

Roy trained me for dishwasher and I work one Tuesday a month, but often fill in on other Tuesdays. Volunteers are always in need. Positions include cooks, servers, dishwashers, and janitorial. I am definitely not a cook, so being a dishwasher makes me happy.

I enjoy the opportunity to participate in the community. It is a fun environment in the kitchen - everyone wants to be there. We give a little time, but hopefully make a big difference for others.

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Link for Lectors

Most of us like to see our readings in advance to avoid traps in pronunciation and wording. Here at St. John, we use Track 2 of the Revised Common Lectionary. This track integrates the lessons and psalm into a related whole, unlike the pattern of Track 1. Here is the link to the Track 2 lectionary: https://www.lectionarypage.net/

For pronunciation of some of the names, good old Google works. Simply ask Google how to pronounce whatever it is. In addition, I can recommend a dictionary site that is reliable and does not require that you be a subscriber: https://www.dictionary.com/ . Simply enter the word or name in the search box, and voila! There it is with an option to hear the pronunciation.

From your own computer, you may easily access the set of lessons and Gospel for the date you will serve. If you encounter any difficulties, just contact the church for assistance or to obtain a copy of the lessons for your Sunday.
