THANKSGIVING

Every Fall, as we gather to give thanks for our many blessings and consider what we can offer the Church as our pledge of support for the coming year, two memories come to the fore.

When I was in sixth grade, I attended a Sunday School which offered weekly Bible lessons and a short prayer service at which a collection was taken. We were told to put a coin in the plate for something we were thankful for in the past week. This was taken to an usher in the sanctuary downstairs, so it could be added to the adults' pledges and other offerings.

In theory, this was an effective way to instruct children not only to be thankful for daily blessings, but to support the church with offerings that might one day turn into pledges. Occasionally, the teacher would ask us to declare what we were thankful for as the plate passed by us. I'm sure she was only trying to expand our sense of gratitude by hearing from others, but I found this very intrusive and embarrassing. To me, what I put in the plate – and why – was between God and me. (Still is.)

Some kids had momentous things to be thankful for, like getting a new puppy or a new baby in the family, or a trip to Disneyland. They laughed at my more trivial thanksgivings, like seeing a horny toad on my way to school, getting a good grade on a test, or getting a postcard from my globetrotting grandmother. Once when I had no money at all, I wanted to skip Sunday School to avoid being singled out for putting nothing into the collection, but a friend urged me to come. As we walked to church, I found a penny on the sidewalk. So, I not only had something to be thankful for, but a coin to celebrate it. God had provided and giving back to God was pure joy.

Years later, while at school in Italy, I returned heirloom jewelry from a dear family friend to her relatives in Rome. I was nervous about this side trip I couldn't really afford but felt duty-bound to honor the friend. Her relatives were surprisingly ungrateful. They grabbed the box and slammed the door in my face. Since I had missed the return train, I needed a place to stay. Long story short, I was promised a cot in a convent's linen closet, which would take every bit of money I had with me. Since I couldn't check in until after 4 p.m., I wandered around a nearby garden and miraculously found a 2,000 lire banknote on the ground (about \$2.50), which was enough for a panini and coffee. I split the panini between dinner that night and breakfast the next morning and was very grateful I didn't have to fast until I got back to school the next afternoon. Once again, God had provided.

I shared my story with an American nun who was also a guest of the convent and leaving the same morning. She emptied her wallet of Italian currency that she said she could not take back to the States and gave it to me. Although I had never mentioned how much money the trip had cost, she gave me exactly the amount I had spent on the train ticket, the meal, and the night in that closet. She apologized for not having more to give. I cried because her gift was more than I could have ever dreamed possible. I've been trying to pay it forward for over 40 years, and even though I don't recall her name, I say a special prayer for that nun every Thanksgiving

For it is in Giving that We Receive

Thanks to our culinary contributors, our 2023 Stewardship Campaign kicked off with a delightful brunch on October 16. We briefly discussed our goal to pledge a minimum of \$54,000 in 2023, which is about 23% more than was pledged for this year (more about that below). Two types of pledge forms were passed out (and later mailed to those who could not attend). Extra copies are also available in the office if you misplaced yours or didn't get one. Please fill out both forms, being sure your name is on them, and return them as soon as possible. They can be placed in the collection plate on Sundays or mailed to the church at P.O. Box 246, Bandon, OR 97411. The church should receive them **no later than Sunday, November 20, 2022,** when we'll gather once more to celebrate all the ways we have found to give and be thankful for what we have received.

TIME AND TALENT. One form lists all the volunteer positions available during worship and while looking after our fellow members, taking care of the church and our community. This is your opportunity to let us know if you want to continue one of the listed ministries or try something new in 2023. Active participation in the work of the church not only helps others but enriches our own spiritual lives.

PLEDGE. The other form declares your intention to contribute financially to our day-to-day operations. Pledges are our primary source of income and drive the operating budget. For the past three years, the Episcopal Bishop of Oregon (EBOF) grant has helped us cover clergy costs, but in 2023 we will be fully funding all operating costs on our own. This means that not only must we ask everyone who has been pledging to pledge a little more in 2023, but also everyone else who hasn't pledged this year but considers St. John their church home to consider making a pledge at this time. The amount you choose is between you and God (and the Treasurer, who is sworn to secrecy).

HOW PLEDGES ARE SPENT. For every dollar that you pledge, \$0.54 covers clergy costs (stipend and benefits); \$0.13 maintains the building and grounds; \$0.11 funds administrative costs; \$0.10 funds worship supplies and music ministry; \$0.10 goes to the Episcopal Diocese of Oregon; and \$0.02 is dedicated to "Mission" which includes advertising, evangelism, Christian education, and some of St. John's outreach efforts.

PROGRESS REPORT. Our stewardship campaign got off to a great start during the first week, bringing in over \$18,000. In Theresa Hall, you'll find a chart with cups to be filled each week as more pledges come in – may each cup overflow!



REVIEW: WORLDINPRAYER.ORG

Influential Swiss Calvinist theologian Karl Barth (1886-1968) is renowned for many things, not least among them the fact that he was a leader of the Confessing Church movement that defiantly opposed the Nazis before and during WWII. He was the chief drafter of their definitive document, the Barmen Declaration, which insisted that Jesus Christ is alone Head of the Church, and that no mere human can usurp that position. (Dietrich Bonhoeffer's signature to that Declaration contributed to his murder by the Third Reich.)

But every Reformed church seminarian (and I suspect nearly all other contemporary seminarians) remembers Barth most for a pithy exhortation quoted repeatedly to us in homiletics (preaching) courses: "Preach with the Bible in one hand and the newspaper in the other." He, of course, intended to encourage pastors to preach the Gospel with relevance.

I have found it extremely challenging to my personal equilibrium in recent years even to read or watch "the news" as it is being presented by most media sources. And yet I am uneasy knowing that it is only my personal privilege as a white, retired, financially comfortable small-town American that enables me to avoid the grim realities of much of the world's population. I would like to share with you an online resource I was blessed to stumble upon that enables me to **pray** "with the Bible in one hand and the news in the other."

At <u>worldinprayer.org</u>, one can read a weekly prayer that lifts up current events around the world, both challenging and encouraging, and helps us include them in our own prayers. It also often confesses doubts and reiterates that God (not us!) is in charge of God's world, a reminder and reassurance that I for one regularly need!

You can simply go to their website to read the current week's prayer (and others), or if you find them helpful, you can sign up to have it emailed directly to you. The prayers are inclusive but vary in content, style, form, and length, and are not attributed to a particular individual. Certainly, some "hit the spot" (for me) more than others, but I suspect those "others" suit different readers better.
