CHRISTMAS WORSHIP PLANS

We have begun the season of Advent. Christmas will soon be upon us.

The Choir has been in rehearsal. If they can stay healthy, the plan is that they will sing for us on Dec. 18 and at the Christmas Eve Service.

Wednesday December 21st is the Winter Solstice, the longest night of the year. The Wednesday Zoom Evening Prayer will be doing a form of what is called the Longest Night Service. This service is a Christmas service that recognizes that this time of year is not always joyful, but it can be hopeful.

The Christmas Eve service will begin at 4:30pm. It will be a service of Lessons and Carols followed by communion.

Christmas Day is a Sunday this year. While it is likely that many of us will be caught up with other things, Holy Eucharist will be offered at 9:30, as usual.

Fr. Doug will be on vacation the week after Christmas, so Sunday January 1 will be Morning Prayer.

Fr. Doug's Iconic Column

Three years ago, the congregation of St. John started on an experiment with my becoming your half-time Priest. This would have been very difficult to accomplish on our own. So, we sought financial assistance from the Bishop's Fund (EBOF). We were given a three-year grant that was quite substantial the first year and then decreased in the second year and then again in the third year. This next year we will be without Diocesan support.

The hope was that we would have three years to build up the life of St. John, to make it more able to meet the financial challenge of supporting a half-time Priest. But these past three years have not been what we had anticipated. The arrival of the COVID pandemic pushed us into taking steps toward keeping us together and surviving the limitations put upon us, rather than growing. As the end of the three years got closer and closer, a few of us became pessimistic about the prospects of being able to continue to support a half-time Priest.

We launched our Stewardship Campaign for 2023 with a fairly big increase in the goal for pledges. As the several weeks of the campaign went on, it did not look like we were going to reach our goal. But by the end of the campaign, we surpassed our goal by 8%. Those of us who were pessimistic started letting out exclamations of joy and "Hallelujah."

As I think about these past 3 years, we certainly were in a kind of survival mode, but at the same time we were exercising creativity and we were learning new skills. St. John was getting stronger and growing in ways we had not anticipated. For one thing, we have developed skills that allows us to have an online presence in. We were pushed into entering the 21st century. I think we have learned how much we appreciate the opportunity to be together, when we went through times of not being able to do so.

The Holy Spirit has been at work among us, holding together much of what St. John has been and adding new things to our life together. Who knows what the Spirit has in store for us in 2023 and beyond. Keeping our eyes and ears open for new possibilities will be the key. We need to open our hearts and minds to the possible changes and challenges that await us. We need to trust that God will see us through it all, as God has these past three years.

What will these next three years be like? Let's go find out!



Bishop's Advisory Committee Notes – November 2022

Here's what took place at the November BAC meeting.

We Reviewed

Notable financial issues:

- -Pass-through fund third quarter contribution of \$377 was paid to Bandon Feeds the Hungry.
- \$129.40 from Ukraine collection box was add to the \$1,000 we sent to Episcopal Relief & Development from the Operating Fund.
- The Medical Loan Closet contributed \$1,200 in facilities use fees.
- The 2023 Diocesan Program Assessment is likely to be higher than anticipated.

We Learned

Pledges received to date are \$2300 below budget; \$35,938 is pledged with 14 people pledging.

About 10 folks have returned their Time and Talent forms.

Coast Community Health Clinic hasn't responded to a request for a recommendation of a family for holiday support.

Leftover Halloween candy has been shipped to an organization that sends it to deployed troops. The choir has resumed and is meeting on Thursdays evenings.

We Discussed

BAC membership for next year. Members going off the BAC include Judy, Maggie, Mary, and Lani. This coming Sunday's Morning Prayer/memorial service for Myra Lawson, with a reception to follow. How to arrange extra seating in case community members come for Myra's service.

We Decided

To send Christmas cards to those who do not attend regularly etc. but not to our regular attending folk or wider community. (Judy to coordinate.)

We voted to accept the resignation of Beth as our clerk.

Musings from Denise

ANTICIPATION

Although the Christmas season is only twelve days long and doesn't start until Christmas Day, you'd never know it by how early Christmas songs begin to creep into TV and radio programming, and stores begin to display Christmas decorations and merchandise. Certainly, I am not the first to bemoan the commercialism of Christmas. What is also lamentable is the loss of attention to the pre-Christmas season of Advent.

Traditionally, Advent was a four-week period of spiritual preparation for both a celebration of the birth of Jesus and anticipation of His Second Coming. Far from the frenzied shopping and partying of modern times, it was a period of fasting, solemn reflection, repentance, and almsgiving sometimes referred to as a mini-Lent. Even the traditional color for Advent (purple or violet) displayed a connection to that longer penitential season. The modern liturgical color for Advent is royal blue, and the intention is to focus on joyous expectation.

Advent wreaths help count the weeks and focus on themes in the lectionary: **Hope, Love, Joy, and Peace**. The circular wreath adorned with evergreen boughs represents eternity and unending love. Four candles are arranged around the wreath, with a large white "Christ Candle" in the center. Three candles are blue (or purple), and one is pink or rose. Blue candles are lit on the first, second and fourth Sundays, but on the third Sunday, the candle that represents Joy is pink and signals a shift away from repentance and toward celebration (the fasting is almost over!) The Christ candle is lit on Christmas Eve.

Advent hymns express our anticipation of the coming of the Messiah. The hymnal we use today (adopted in 1 tains over twenty Advent hymns, most of which I still don't recognize. Some of the most familiar ("O come, O come uel," "Come thou long-expected Jesus," and "On Jordan's Bank," for example) are among seven of the fourteen Adve contained in an earlier edition (adopted in 1892). That earlier hymnal, which St. John's earliest members used, had hymns that sadly didn't carry over to our current hymnal. They marked the passage from the old year to the new year a couple stanzas (the first and last) from the "Hymn for the Old Year" by The Rev. James Hamilton in 1882:

Across the sky the shades of night this winter's eve are fleeting. We deck thine altar, Lord, with light, in solemn worship meeting. And as the year's last hours go by, we lift to thee our earnest cry, once more thy love entreating. . . .

Then, O great God, in years to come, whatever fate betide us, Right onward through our journey home be thou at hand to guide us.

Nor leave us till at close of life, safe from all perils, toil, and strife, Heaven shall unfold and hide us.

Let us travel together through Advent and approach Christmas with joy and anticipation. Then as we bid farewell to 2022, let us remember the love of friends and family no longer with us, wonder at the wideness of God's goodness and mercy toward us, and step courageously into the new year with God at hand to guide us.

For it is in giving that we receive

Every autumn, our church holds a stewardship campaign to collect pledges of time, talents, and funds for the coming year. We count on every person who worships at St. John or otherwise feels a connection to this place to reflect on how much they value their relationship with the church and our church family. We greatly appreciate your generosity!

We launched our stewardship campaign for 2023 with an ambitious goal of \$54,000, hoping that all our financial supporters would see the truth of St. Francis' statement: "it is in giving that we receive." We recognized that even though this goal was a whopping 23% increase over the \$43,894 we pledged for 2022, it would not be enough to cover all our normal operating expenses. But that's okay because pledging isn't about balancing the church's budget. It is a deeply personal reflection on the blessings we have each received and how we can share them with others.

By the end of the first week, over one-third of our members had submitted pledges. Even though most of us increased our pledges, by the official end of the campaign on November 20th (Dedication Sunday) our combined total was about \$3,400 less than this year, which was disappointing.

Fortunately, God is not bound by our self-imposed timelines. In the week following Dedication Sunday, we received additional pledges, and as of November 28th, our total for 2023 was <u>\$58,538</u>, which is about 8.5% over our goal and a 33.5% increase over the current year.

Of course, stewardship is about more than money. As people sign up to share their time and talents with the congregation by filling roles within the worship services, handling chores around the church, and taking up various leadership roles, they demonstrate their commitment to the ongoing work of the church. In doing those things, we not only give but receive.

Thank you to all who pledged your time, talents, and treasure to St. John's for 2023.
