#### LET'S REMEMBER WE'RE STANDING ON THEIR SHOULDERS

What little I know of American history I gleaned long after I left high school and met European students who knew U.S. history better than I did. (Most embarrassing!) My high school history teacher was the varsity football coach and clearly not interested in the textbook version of U.S. History he was expected to teach. If you were on the football team, all you had to do was show up for roll call every day to earn an "A." If you were a girl (or a boy who was *not* on the football team) you began the year with a "D" and had to work hard to raise your grade. He focused on complex tabletop exercises to demonstrate the conflicting interests of various imaginary colonies, but not once did we study any *actual* American History.

As we celebrate Independence Day this month, it seems appropriate to think about the men named below who bravely signed the Declaration of Independence, relying on "the protection of Divine Providence" and mutually pledging to each other "our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor." These were well -educated, well-to-do men. Almost half were lawyers and jurists. Eleven were merchants, nine were farmers and large plantation owners. One was a physician/clergyman. Some would go on to political careers. Some were captured by the British as traitors and tortured to death, some lost their lives (or loved ones) in the Revolutionary War, some lost their properties and fortunes and died in abject poverty, but all sacrificed for the liberties we now enjoy.

### From Laurea Arnoldt, Bishop's Warden

## "So, Noted"

Highlights of the Bishop's Advisory Committee held June 11, 2023:

**Finances** -- The last of the Amazon Smile Rewards were received in May. The income for May was below budget due to less offerings being received. Fundraiser ideas were discussed: An Estate Sale, a large Garage Sale, or Concerts with wine & cheese events. Fr. Doug asked Laurea, the Senior Warden, to convene the Fundraising Committee.

## Reports

<u>Landscaping</u> – High Tide's maintenance of church property including the field cost \$280 in May. Due to a 25% increase in fees, the next full-service clean-up will be \$350, but we have sufficient funds in the budget for up-keep.

<u>New Roof on the Church</u> – First estimate from Madding was \$58,000, based on measurements via Google Earth, Second Estimate was Rayburn Roofing at \$68,282, with the stainless-steel nails. However, Rayburn has some history of not getting required permits. Third estimate was Rusty from Evergreen that did the roof on Shepherd's House, still waiting for bid. Sally will continue to get roofing bids. Laurea is working on a Grant from the Diocese to assist.

The BAC discussed inviting a <u>Financial Advisor</u> to explain how a person could use their 401K funds to help the church financially and reduce taxes on their Required Minimum Distributions.

Parking Lot Expansion – The city's main requirements are: 1) a 24-foot driveway apron and 2) a plan to deal with rainwater being diverted down Edison Avenue. Fr. Doug suggested this expansion could be put on "the back burner" to focus more on the roof.

<u>Scatter Garden</u> – Establishing a scatter garden in the courtyard requires permission from the Diocese before presenting a preapplication to the City, then applying to the State. The City will be asked if the property line along Franklin Avenue could be moved. Plants in the garden would be low maintenance. Bricks from the old chimney could be inscribed with the names of those buried in the Scatter Garden.

<u>Safe Church & Licenses</u> – A couple BAC members need to complete the Safe Church classes. Lay licenses were renewed for Denise and Ginger.

<u>Special Events</u> – A Convocation will occur in August/September. On 9/23/1893 the cornerstone was laid for St. John's first church. We will celebrate the 130th Anniversary with a potluck for the congregation, picnic style at 1:30 pm 9/23/2023.

<u>Upcoming BAC Meetings</u> – 7/9, 8/13 and 9/10/23

## The Candid Confessions of a Medical Loan Closet Volunteer

**Sin 1: Smugness.** I luckily don't have the problems our clients do and I feel relatively nimble. Since I'm "younger" I can help them.

Virtue 1: Humility. There but for the grace of God go I. My time will come.

**Sin 2: Irritation**. It's annoying when clients don't show up for an appointment, when they call during dinner, or when they damage equipment.

**Virtue 2: Empathy.** Our clients endure physical and emotional pain and juggle medical appointments, work, family and all of life's monkey wrenches. I can support them.

Sin 3: Introversion. Thinking wishfully, I hope that today will be a call-free day and I can simply stay home.

Virtue 3: Opportunity. The MLC offers a chance to meet and get to know interesting and diverse people. I'm glad I don't stay home.

Sin 4: Bias. A messy appearance and a junky car = a messy and suspect client.

**Virtue 4: Openness.** A woman driving a Porsche SUV was abrasive and repeatedly failed to return equipment. A gap-toothed man in an old beater returned his equipment clean, on time, and handed me a thank you check for \$50. I stand corrected.

**Sin 5: Tedium.** A wheelchair has 4 wheels with a total of 36 wheel spokes that each must be cleaned and sanitized. I've cleaned an endless litany of toilet risers, walkers, wheelchairs, commodes, and shower stools in my years with the MLC, sigh.

Virtue 5: Diligence. Spoke by spoke gets the important job done. Cleanliness is next to Godliness.

Sin 6: Temerity. How to be tough when calling a grumpy and delinquent client for the umpteenth time?

Virtue 6: Kindness. Take a walk in his shoes. If his problems were mine, I'd be grumpy too.

Sin 7: Complacency. Another duty week, another client - the same old, same old.

**Virtue 7: Wonder.** A 104 year old woman (who at 104 survived COVID!) keeps hanging on and still needs our wheelchair. A nearly crippled woman now moves with pain-free ease following her knee replacement. A man whose home burned down tearfully thanks us for not expecting compensation for the lost equipment. These and 100 similar stories shake me up and I'm ever so grateful.
