Fr. Doug's Iconic Column

I went for a visit with Debbie Griffith a number of days ago. When I arrived, I found that one of her friends was there visiting with her. She and Debbie have been members of a Bible Study. Her friend is a member of one of the evangelical churches.

At first, the conversation was focused upon Debbie and the difficulty she is having recovering from her back surgery. Part of that conversation was about how Debbie's faith in Christ helps her face the frustration and pain. Her friend and I sought to be encouraging. Over the course of the conversation, we could see Debbie's countenance rise. She went from looking weary to energized, from sadness to laughter.

At the same time, my spirits rose because something wonderful was happening. I am truly thankful that God granted that I be a part of it.

While the conversation began with Debbie's situation, it moved on to other matters of our spiritual lives. Debbie's friend and I were getting to know each other a bit and appreciating the depth of our spiritual lives. We talked some about the need for humility even while we might have some form of leadership in the church. Our eyes were to be upon God and doing what God called upon us to do rather than upon being up front and leading other people. I felt I was in the company of a kindred spirit.

But there was something else about this encounter that touched my heart. Debbie's friend is part of a church whose leaders seem to have little desire to interact with me. And on the other hand, I am part of a church whose members probably have little interest in having anything to do with that other church. And yet here we were having a splendid time sharing our faith in Christ.

It is so easy to focus upon the things that differ between us in the Church that we hardly ever see what we have in common. Quite often it is that we have simply written each other off and we don't even look. We keep each other at arm's length.

That day at Debbie's house I had not sought out this encounter, but the Spirit gave it to me as a gift. I am so thankful for it. It is my prayer that, despite our reluctance to reach out to people with whom we disagree, the Spirit will gift us with opportunities to see God in them and be mutually supportive in our faith. I also pray that we might find the courage to take a chance, reach across the divides and try to walk with our sisters and brothers in Christ.

This is what is needed in our country and our world. We need to develop compassion, empathy and appreciation for those with whom we differ. We may not change the things over which we differ, but we may learn that there is more there to see than what divides us.



Musings from Denise

GIVE THANKS TO THE LORD, FOR HE IS GOOD

People who contribute to a church fall into two categories: <u>Dues Payers</u> and <u>Church Givers</u>. Some people view pledging as paying dues for membership in the church – an obligation to the institution, rather than a desire to further God's work. They give from a sense of duty and not love.

The pledges and other offerings sought at St. John's are gifts given with a heart of gratitude for God's many blessings. They are a means of joyfully acknowledging that all we have comes from God. Returning a portion of our income to expand God's work is part of our walk with Christ, and every gift, both large and small, from every person counts. Together, we can support our church's mission to heal, teach, reach out, and be good stewards.

Psalm 136 begins: "Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good, for his mercy endures forever." Twenty-six verses outline how God has demonstrated his goodness from the moment of creation to the settlement of Israel in what is now the Middle East. According to the Book of Common Prayer's translation, every verse ends with: "for his mercy endures forever."

Other translations replace "mercy" with LOVE, FAITHFULNESS, LOVING-KINDNESS, GRA-CIOUS or STEADFAST LOVE. They all remind us that however unworthy we may become through thoughts, words or deeds, God's love for us never fails, and for that we can be eternally grateful. It is a dark reality that we sometimes forget to be grateful until the month of November gets us back on track with a holiday dedicated to thankfulness.

It is not by chance that our stewardship campaign finishes at this time of year. Nor is it by chance that the Diocese takes up a "Thanksgiving Offering" from all the churches (on November 19 this year). This offering is distributed through grants that enable local faith communities to serve people in need through projects such as food pantries, community gardens, medical clinics, and houseless shelters. It is not meant to compete with our local church's solicitation of funds for the coming year, it is an opportunity to help multiply God's blessings.


