Fr. Doug's Iconic Column

This Saturday, March 2, Emmanuel Parish in Coos Bay will be offering a showing of "The Philadelphia Eleven," a documentary about the first women ordained to the priesthood in the Episcopal Church. It begins at Noon and we are all invited.

We have entered the season of Lent. To mark the time, we have returned to the use of Holy Eucharist Rite I. Several people have commented on how meaningful it is for them. It is certainly more penitential, especially since we are also using the Penitential Rite at the beginning of the service. It is also very familiar for those who grew up in the Episcopal Church and were used to hearing these words every Sunday.

Lent is a time of preparation as we make our way with Jesus to Jerusalem, to his suffering and death, and ultimately to his resurrection. It certainly is a time to reflection upon what the Son of God went through for our benefit. It can also be a time to find how his suffering connects God to our suffering. I have put together a booklet of "The Way of the Cross," the Stations of the Cross, traveling with Jesus to the cross, beginning with him being condemned to death. It uses the order found in the Prayer Book and couples it with images of the Stations. While we do have the Stations in our sanctuary, it is difficult to travel from one to the next with the pews in the way. (Well... maybe the way of the cross should be difficult). So, this booklet allows you to travel with Jesus, and he with you, in your own home. Please pick up a copy at the church if you do not have one already.

Holy Week comes at the end of the month. We will celebrate Palm/Passion Sunday on the 24th. We will have a Maundy Thursday service on the 28th at 4:30pm and a Good Friday service on the 29th at 4:30pm.

As we prepare for Easter, some churches hold the long Easter Vigil well into the wee hours of the morning. Some have an opportunity for people to take an hour or two and sit in the sanctuary in vigil, in prayer, throughout Holy Saturday. I have not heard much interest among our folk for either option. So instead, I am preparing a modified Easter Vigil that can be used at home on that Saturday. It could be used in one long sitting or multiple shorter times throughout the day. It has multiple scripture readings telling the length of sal (continued on page 2)

vation history culminating in the resurrection of Jesus, followed by a renewal of baptismal vows. This booklet will be made available in a week or so.

In your use of these resources, you are certainly welcome to come to the church and use them in the sanctuary if you wish. Whatever choices we make for our own devotions, I pray that we all have a Holy Lent.

Musings from Denise

HOW DO OTHERS SEE US?

A satirical student magazine called "Ship of Fools" was launched at a London Bible College in the late 1970's. It sank after only ten issues, but was relaunched in 1998 as a website, and is still sailing along at https://shipoffools.com. Its aim, according to Editor Simon Jenkins, 'is to help Christians be self-critical and honest about the failings of Christianity, as we believe honesty can only strengthen faith.' One feature of this online magazine is called "Mystery Worshipper," in which a volunteer attends a church where they are not known and reports their experience by answering a standard questionnaire touching on the type of service and how well-attended it was, the comfort of the pews, the pre-service atmosphere and post-service hospitality, the music, how welcoming the people were, the length and substance of the sermon, whether the service was "stiff-upper-lip, happy clappy, or what?"

From time to time, it is helpful to approach our worship services as though we ourselves are first-time visitors. What can we do to make the experience more welcoming and meaningful for our visitors? We come to church each Sunday and on High Holy Days, driving past a sign that affirms we welcome everyone. We worship God in accordance with the Episcopal Book of Common Prayer, we listen to scripture and a homily and sing hymns, then share a cup of coffee and a little conversation before going out into the world to live, work and play until next Sunday. It's easy to presume all Christians (or at least all Episcopalians) do this in a comparable way. But every congregation has its own unique customs (like the way we sit through the postlude), which sometimes make it hard for visitors to follow along and feel welcome.

For instance, one Mystery Worshipper (MW for short) attended **St. Paul Lutheran Church** in Phoenix, Az, where she was greeted in the narthex by a few people and by the pastor after she sat down. After confirming she was not Lutheran, the pastor told her she would not be welcome to receive communion. MW expected that but was perplexed by what took place after the collection was taken up. A group of women came up to the baptismal font, walked in a circle around it, and then returned to their seats. No explanation was given. [A reader later suggested that they were bringing mite boxes forward.] But at the time, it was "as if a veil had descended" between MW and the service. She suddenly felt out of place and left as communion was being distributed.

Other MWs reported being distracted by the worship party's attire: a pastor wearing an alb with a cincture that had one end dragging on the floor, and white sneakers with a green Nike logo; a couple altar servers wearing red sneakers. These may seem trivial to some, but they also became a veil of separation for those visitors.

At **St Peter's, Frogwell**, Chippenham, Wiltshire, UK (Church of England) a lady welcomed the MW just inside the entrance and asked his name and where he was from. After the service, MW was approached by the same lady, who remembered his name and introduced MW to someone else who took him under her wing as coffee was served and introduced him to other people at the table. MW "got the impression that the friendliness wasn't for show, and that people genuinely care for each other at this church."

That is, I think, what we all hope visitors to St. John will see: all are genuinely welcome.


