Following the Eucharistic Service on Sunday, July 13, 2025, St. John's congregation processed to the south lawn, where a new structure stood waiting to be blessed and commissioned for the benefit of the entire community.

Deb Holder was inspired by many "Little Free Pantries" in the Eugene area and wanted to start one in Bandon. She and Judy Jackson approached Fr. Doug about having this community service located at St. John. This may be the first Little Free Pantry in the Central and South Coast of Oregon.

Our "Little Free Pantry" is stocked with donated shelf stable, non-perishable foods. The public is invited to "Give What You Can" and "Take What You Need." Suggested donations (new and unopened):

St. John BAC met on July 13, 2025.

Financial Report-The highlights are as follows:

<u>Reconciliations</u>- The Morgan Stanley account has been reconciled through June 30th. The June statement for the Sweet Fund has not arrived. The Vicar's Discretionary account has been reconciled through June 30th and has a balance of \$552.98. The primary checking account is reconciled. The June 30th statement shows the \$784 the bank deposited to the wrong customer's account on May 27th has been restored to our account. The Money Market is still under review. The bank charged us \$97.36 in June for checks they said they would provide for free. That charge was finally reversed on July 10th.

<u>Balance Sheet</u>- Altar Fund had no activity in June. The Medical Loan Closet received \$260 in donations and ended June with \$3,442.98. The Memorial Garden Fund spent \$151.06 on plants and soil, bringing the balance to \$1,563.46. The Capital Fund received \$1,500 in donations and paid \$2,674 to Civil West Engineering for invoices #2 and #3. Invoice #4 for \$1,099 was paid on July 8 and will appear on the next report.

<u>Investments</u>- Morgan Stanley account added interest of \$70.98 in June, bringing the balance to \$22,054.82. Sweet Fund had a net gain of \$1,237.59 in May, bringing the balance to \$35,784.73.

Senior Warden-A request was made to investigate an interesting "musical" that a local individual is working on titled, "Young Jesus". We are interested in learning more about this project. We will keep you updated.

Junior Warden-The Parking Lot subcommittee accepted a final draft (ours) and will submit that to the engineer at Civil West Engineering. A new "Inclusion" banner is being made and will replace the tattered one up. The "Green Team" reports that we mad it through an energy assessment with flying colors. They will continue with the recycling of cans and bottles, paper and cardboard. The idea of placing solar panels will be put aside for now. That will be a future endeavor. As for the kitchen, we will need to replace the dishwasher and monitor the oven temperatures.

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Fr. Doug's Iconic Column

An old Facebook post by a former hospice co-worker appeared in my Notifications. It was written eight years ago and was a reflection on events from eight years before. Deb was a nurse, and I was a chaplain, for a hospice in Massachusetts.

On a fateful early morning, Deb had called our boss Nanci saying she would not be in to work. She was hardly able to get the words out of her mouth that her estranged husband had snuck into the house in the middle of the night and killed their 5-year-old daughter. Deb called back later and asked Nanci if I could stop by at some point. Nanci then explained that I was already on the way. Nanci had called me and asked me to go and spend however long I needed to support Deb in any way that I could. I spent the day with Deb and her extended family who had gathered there, while police officers did their investigation. Later I helped plan and then lead the little girl's funeral.

What was important about Deb's Facebook post was her reflection upon all the support that she had received from family and friends and especially her colleagues in the hospice. I must admit that reading it again brought me to tears, because my role in that support was very prominent in her reflection. The tragedy of the event sixteen years ago has faded for me but being reminded about the importance of my relationship with Deb and the other members of our hospice has touched me deeply even now.

Recently I have been reflecting upon the importance of other people in the variety of places I have lived and worked. I have lived and worked in a lot of different places in my life: Portland, Eugene, Florence, Tillamook, Sutherlin, La Grande, Baker City, John Day, Ontario, Coos Bay and Bandon Oregon; San Anselmo, California; New Meadows, Idaho; Evanston, Illinois; Hanson, Massachusetts. I have been a part of churches in all those places, as well as a couple of hospice and campus ministries. And in all those gatherings of people I cared about the people that were a part of them. I touched their lives, and they touched mine. Sometimes I regret leaving all those important people behind, wishing that I had been more stable, something like the 80-year-old parishioner I had in Sutherlin who had lived in the same house her whole life. But then I consider how my moving around has gifted me with an amazing number of people whom I cherish for their parts in my life and I in theirs. If it had been up to me, I would have lived in far fewer place, but God apparently had other plans.

All of us at St. John have been on the move in our lives. Some have left and returned later in life. Some have been here for quite some time but didn't start here. Some are recent

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additions to our fellowship. We have all left behind people who were important parts of our lives. They valued us and we valued them. Those people have been gifts to us and now the people here are gifts to us and we to them. And we all are gifts from God. It is important to cherish all those people and maybe even let them know how important they have been in our lives.

I leave on vacation after church on August 3rd. I will be gone for three weeks. The first week will be spent in Calgary, Canada where Patti will be meeting with members of the Anglican Dominican Order and celebrating their shared life together (I get to tag along). The second week Patti and I will be going on an Alaska Cruise to celebrate the 35 years of our shared life together. Then we return to Oregon for a final week that will include a large gathering of the Hale family, people who have been a part of my life from the beginning.

But don't worry. I am coming back. I am under orders from above (and from you) that I cannot leave. We all still have a lot to do to be here for one another. God has brought us together.

During the past fourteen years, oil furnaces were replaced by heat pumps; energy saving windows and lights were installed. 
